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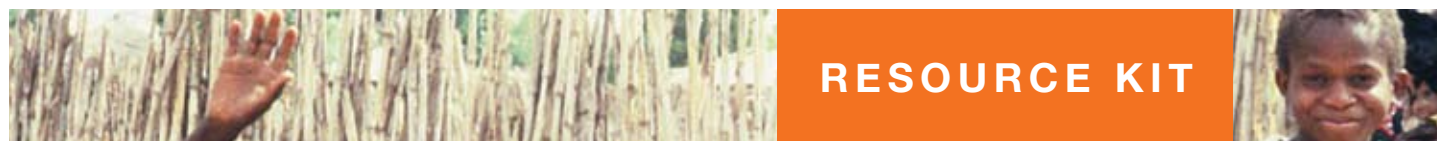

The **Africa: Communities in Action Resource Kit** is comprised of two resources: a 350 page instructional guide on CD and a DVD of the award-winning Knowledge Network documentary *The Gambia: Communities in Action*. The DVD is designed as a case study, providing students and teachers with a compelling, positive look at the West African Rural Development (WARD) program and trained community development workers putting their skills in action in rural Gambia, one of the poorest countries in the world. Many development issues introduced here (gender, cultural and religious challenges, poverty, rural-urban divisions) are further explored in the Guide.

The Instructional Guide contains more than 40 interactive, classroom-tested activities in critical development areas with one overarching theme: We all share the same planet with its limited resources and

interconnected environment. We can no longer afford a “them and us” attitude. What affects Africa affects us.

By seeing the human face of Africa in this positive and inspiring documentary, and then exploring global issues further through well-designed, experiential activities, students will gain a greater appreciation for the global community we are all a part of and become more engaged in solving the human and environmental problems we collectively face. As narrator Mary Bissell concludes in the documentary, “I had come expecting to find a poor nation, but instead I have discovered one that is rich in potential and overflowing with community spirit. Maybe Canadians have something to learn from The Gambia.”

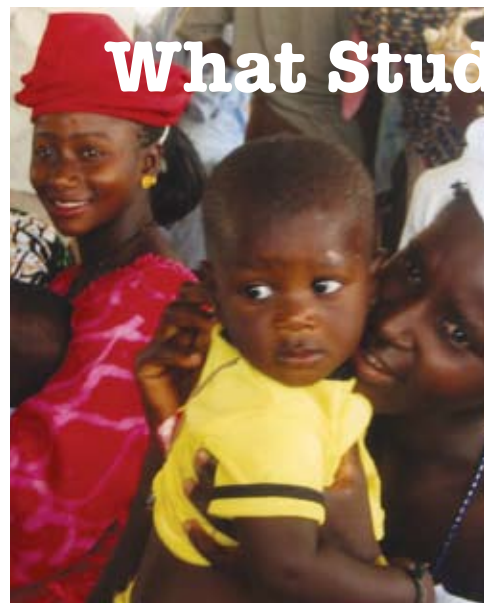
Besides the hands-on student activities, the Instructional Guide includes key background readings, information on CIDA and Canadian aid priorities, maps, inquiry-based instructional strategies, evaluation suggestions, and annotated listings of supplementary resources. The activities and background reading address a number of key issues introduced in the documentary: gender and development, child health and infant mortality, general health issues and HIV/AIDS, aid effectiveness, community development and mobilization, causes and effects of poverty, urban drift, globalization, concepts and roots of development and underdevelopment, the role of industrialized countries in helping to alleviate world poverty, fair trade and other trade issues, population, the role of education in development, the importance of girl child education, and development and the environment.

The Instructional Guide was put together by African development specialists with more than 50 years of combined field experience and real educators working with high school and adult students. Part of the inspiration for the project was the recognition that there is very little current, engaging material, print or AV, devoted to the emerging curriculum areas of global education international development. This Instructional Guide and film documentary package will help fill that gap.

The Instructional Guide is provided on a CD in MS Word and PDF format. These specific issues and activities are organized into seven units.
